From the Rabbi



Like athletics, physical exercise, and even singing, spiritual experiences require some warm-up. Jewish tradition provides us with a variety

of spiritual warm-up opportunities. Our Morning Service, for example, is preceded by a Preliminary Service which is intended to get us into a prayerful mood and frame of mind. Some *mitzvot* are preceded by a meditation, followed by a *b'rakhah*, followed by the performance of the *mitzvah* itself. There, too, we try to warm up before performing a *mitzvah*—hopefully, to enhance the spiritual experience of the *mitzvah*.

So it is with the *Yamim Nora'im*, the Days of Awe, which include *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur*. It would be unrealistic for most of us to try to achieve the spiritual intensity which we expect on the High Holy Days without some kind of spiritual warm-up. Therefore, we traditionally begin the High Holy Day season a number of days before *Rosh Hashanah*, at a late-Saturday-night service known as *Selihot*. The theme and the melodies of the *Selihot* prayers are taken from

the liturgy of the *Yamim Nora'im* and create an atmosphere that leads us into the High Holy Days. Thus, we “hit the ground running” on our spiritual journey that will begin on *Rosh Hashanah* and culminate on *Yom Kippur*.

For the sixth year in a row, B'nai Emet will participate in the community-wide *Selihot* program and service, sponsored by the Minnesota Rabbinical Association and hosted this year by Temple Israel. The service will take place on Saturday night, September 20, and will feature the participation of Twin Cities rabbis, cantors, and choirs. It will be preceded by a study program, at which you will be able to choose from an assortment of learning opportunities, offered by a variety of Twin Cities rabbis and educators. The evening will give you the chance to see friends whom you might not have seen since before the summer, to connect with members of other congregations, to enhance the cohesiveness of our Jewish community, and, hopefully, to achieve a spiritual warm-up as we approach the holidays.

Best wishes to all of you for a happy, healthy new year—and a meaningful *Yamim Nora'im* season.

New Books in the Library

The following books were recently purchased for B'nai Emet's library. Thanks to the Farb family and donors to the Farb Family Library Fund, our library keeps growing with outstanding works.

Beni's Family Treasury: Stories for the Jewish Holidays, Jane Breskin Zalben. Children love these gentle stories and illustrations that introduce the customs and traditions of the Jewish holidays. Recommended for ages 4-8.

The Nazi Officer's Wife: How One Jewish Woman Survived the Holocaust, Edith H. Beer. This fascinating and critically-acclaimed Holocaust memoir tells the story of Edith Hahn Beer, who was a teenage law student in Austria at the start of World War II. When the Nazis took over Austria, she went underground and ended up marrying a Nazi and passing herself off as a German *hausfrau*. B'nai Emet Book Club Selection.

Old Men at Midnight, Chaim Potok. The three novellas that comprise this book are narrated by Potok's character Davita at different stages in her own life. "The Ark Builder" portrays Davita giving English lessons in 1947 to a 16-year-old, the only Jewish Holocaust survivor of his Polish town. "The War Doctor" tells the story of Leon Shertov, who, as a young soldier under Stalin, was saved by a Jewish doctor who was later imprisoned by Stalin. In the final story, "The Trope Teacher," Davita helps a professor of warfare revisit the pivotal events of his life, including his own

My name is Jeanne Kaufman and I am looking forward to another year of exploring Judaism with children in grades K-2 at B'nai Emet Sunday School. I began over 20 years ago teaching a kindergarten class with my son as a student. Since then, I have thoroughly enjoyed all the educational opportunities I have had as inquiring minds of young children have encouraged me to find answers about Judaism.

Reading a *Torah* story to the class and exploring its relevance and impact to young children is very rewarding. Exploring different holiday traditions through songs, games and crafts is really fun too! Having parents, siblings, and extended family members involved offers students and their families opportunities to explore, discuss and create Jewish family traditions—some old and some new.

Since our class is small and children can attend for three years, the curriculum is designed to focus on different aspects of Judaism in a three-year cycle. This year, we will explore *mitzvot*, synagogue, and Israel. We always study the holidays, but I am mindful to use different stories, worksheets, and crafts to avoid repetition for students.

Rabbi Abramson will be visiting our class on a regular basis this year. He will spend about 15 minutes with them at the end of class, and I am sure the students will enjoy Rabbi's discussions, honesty, and openness to questions they might raise.

Sunday School will host a *Sukkot* luncheon on October 12. Parents can attend services in the Fingerhut Sanctuary and children can explore *Sukkot* through songs, stories, puzzles and games in Room 10. Children will join their parents for part of the service, visit the *sukkah*, and afterwards families can enjoy a *Sukkot* luncheon with the entire congregation in the Baratz Social Hall. Even if your children are not enrolled in Sunday School, you are invited to bring them to Room 10 to explore and celebrate *Sukkot* this year.

Shabbat School Update

Shanah Tovah U'metuka! A good, sweet new year to all of our B'nai Emet family! *Mazal tov* to our *bar mitzvah*, Nathan Cera.

Shabbat School classes began on September 6 with an enthusiastic group of students and staff coming to learn and celebrate *Shabbat* together. We welcome our new class of incoming *Alef* students. We are thrilled to have all of our teachers returning from last year. In addition, we welcome last year's *Prozdor* students as new associate tutors, Amir Zadaka as a new teacher, and Michael Lurie as a *Bet* supervisor and *Torah* and *Haftarah* specialist.

Staff attended an orientation along with staff from Beth El and Adath Jeshurun, featuring a presen-

tation by Rabbi Harold Kravitz. *Alef* and *Bet* parents will attend an orientation at *Shabbat* School on September 13, and *Gimel* and *Prozdor* parents will attend on September 20. Our High Holy Day Youth Services will take place during *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur* led by *Shabbat* School teachers. *Shabbat* School students (5th-9th grade) will attend youth service programs from 9:30–11:00 a.m., then join their parents in the Fingerhut Sanctuary. Post-*b'nai mitzvah* students who are not assigned to work in the youth service or babysitting should attend adult services with their parents.

Some additions to the *Shabbat* School program this year include increased participation in Fingerhut Sanctuary services, teacher written and directed lesson plans, adult supervisors in each class, older staff studying with and mentoring younger staff and group studying within each class. *Alef* students will be studying the *Shabbat* morning service, using the text, *A Bridge to Prayer*, by Nachama Skolnik Moskowitz. *Bet* students will be studying the weekly *Torah* portion using the text, *Parshat HaShavuah: Reading Genesis* by Roberta Osser Baum. *Gimel* students will again

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study with Mr. Yefet Zadaka and Prozdor students again with Rabbi Barry Woolf. There will be NO *Shabbat* School classes on October 18 due to MEA weekend.
